2021 Immigrant Heritage Month Celebration WIN's 3rd year Anniversary




On June 8th, the Washington Immigrant Network (WIN) held their 3rd annual (virtual) gathering, celebrating the life and achievements of the immigrant community in Washington State. Highlights of the event included:

For the past several months, WIN has been working on a special project to develop the [Food for Diversity Cultural Recipe Book](#). The goal was to engage and connect with Washington state employees and allies by sharing food recipes, traditions, and cultures.

Thanks to people taking the time to share their recipes, photos, and stories, the project was a huge success. It offers 90 recipes from around the world, including the U.S., Nigeria, Uganda, Korea, Mexico, Italy, Bulgaria, Hungary, Germany and more! Many contributors shared fun and touching stories about what their recipes meant to their families and their culture. The project was a success because of the excellent participation from across state agencies and dedication from a group of WIN volunteers (who also represent several state agencies) that assisted with planning, organizing, and reviewing every submission.

API Business Resource Group


